Know how to assess your skills and ability to DIY

Know how it's going to affect your home value

But before you sink thousands and thousands of dollars into something it's best to know which projects have the <u>greatest impact</u> on the value of your home. It's also a good idea to <u>keep receipts</u> and take before-and-after photos.

Know when the time comes to call in some help
